EXT. COSMETICON CORPORATION BUILDING. MANHATTAN EARLY AFTERNOON.

Ambulance pulls out of building. Dr. Bruce Wagman is pulling out metal cart, piled high with surgical instruments. Driver tries to help him. He waves him away. Pushes the cart himself towards the building. Doorman opens. The door for him. CAMERA FOLLOWS him to elevator.

People are forced out of elevator.

INT. COSMETICON CORPORATION BUILDING. 7TH FLOOR. A FEW MOMENTS LATER.

Dr. Wagman pushes cart to glass door. ENGRAVED TITLE ON DOOR: MARZY SCHMINDORF, CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER.

He goes in.

INT.MARZY SCHMINDORF'S OFFICE.

Marzy is seated at a huge mahogany desk with various of her Cosmeticon packages displayed in bell jars at the front of the desk. SECRETARY rushes in.

SECRETARY

There's a really strange man in your office.

MARZY

Strange. How so?

SECRETARY

He says he's a doctor. He says he's here to perform an operation.

MARZY

What's he look like?

SECRETARY

Wild hair, a green tie- a kind of strange gleam in his eye- might mean he has a sense of humor. Could mean he's a serial killer.

MARZY

Oh, I know what that is. It's Dr. Wagman. Send him in.

Secretary goes out. Immediately Dr. Wagman moves in, pushing his cart.

DR. WAGMAN

Just relax, Ms. Schmindorf. It'll be over in less than an hour.

MARZY

Over- what will be over?

DR. WAGMAN

See all this.

Points to cart.

DR. WAGMAN (CONT'D)

Over half of this is anesthetics. You won't feel anything.

MARZY

What?

DR. WAGMAN

I do all my anesthetics myself. I never use anyone else. Please make yourself comfortable. We can do it right at your desk.

MARZY

Do what?

DR. WAGMAN

The procedure, of course.

DR. WAGMAN

Most people are shocked when they find I can do at their desk, in a couch, on that nice divan in the powder room-

MARZY

Doctor, you got my letter-

DR. WAGMAN

Yes, of course. I'm here.

MARZY

Did you read it?

DR. WAGMAN

I can't read everything I get in the mail. How could I? Especially after that damned news conference? Reading some of those letters make me want to throw up. Not that yours would. I just naturally expected you wanted a procedure. So I came right over.

MARZY

You naturally expected- what? What procedure?

DR. WAGMAN

MARZY

MARZY
